R E G I N A MANDOLIN ORCHESTRA

The Regina Mandolin Orchestra was officially organized in 1988 with 10 members and one mandolin student.

As we enter the RMO's 21st year, the orchestra has grown to more than 40 members and our teaching program regularly serves 30-plus students.

The unique sound of the RMO is based on the plucked strings of the mandolin family of instruments. This rich sound is supplemented by the flute, guitar, violin and sometimes percussion.

We can tailor a program to suit almost any occasion. The RMO has performed at many functions and different venues across the province.

Some notable appearances have been at: the Saskatchewan Order of Merit Awards Ceremony; Opening of the Legislature; Cabinet Minister's Formal Receptions; Cathedral Village Arts Festival, the Saskatchewan Organization for Heritage Languages Conference; Moose Jaw Folk Festival; Fort Qu'Appelle Mid-Summer Arts Festival; Mid-Winter Celidh, The Irish Pavilion at Mosaic in Regina; Multicultural Council concerts and performances in several communities around the province. Many concerts have been filmed by Access Communications and featured on cable television.

The Mandolin

The Mandolin has a long and rich history. The earliest mandolins were constructed in the 1700s in Italy. They originally had a pear shaped body and a short neck.

By the late 1800s, there were entire orchestras of mandolins in Italy, and its popularity had spread to many other parts of Europe including the Ukraine.

In the latter half of the 1800s, many people from Southern Europe immigrated to North America, bringing with them their culture and musical traditions, including the mandolin.

In the early 1900s, an American instrument maker named Orville Gibs redesigned the pear shaped mandolin into a version with a flat top and back. This new style was later imitated by other instrument makers and is the standard today.

The mandolin family of instruments includes the mandolin, octave mandolin, mandola, mando-cello and mando-bass. Mandolin orchestras are springing up in many communities across North America, and the mandolin is played as a solo instrument by many modem day country, bluegrass and classical musicians.
